DISCOVERING BRITISH COLUMBIA

Located on Canada's west coast, B.C. is a province of spectacular landscapes, rich history, and vibrant culture. Geographically and culturally diverse, it offers a wide range of experiences for travelers of all backgrounds.

HISTORY

British Columbia has a history that spans thousands of years. Long before European contact, Indigenous peoples such as the Haida, Nuu-chah-nulth, and Coast Salish thrived in this region. In 1778, British explorer James Cook arrived on the coast, marking the beginning of trade with Europeans. The 1858 gold rush drew thousands of settlers, leading to the establishment of the Colony of British Columbia. In 1871, the province joined the Canadian Confederation, paving the way for rapid development.

GEOGRAPHY

B.C. is home to a wide variety of landscapes, from the majestic Rockies and Cascade Mountains to the wild beaches of the Pacific Ocean. The province boasts numerous national parks, such as Yoho and Kootenay, perfect for nature lovers. Vibrant cities like Vancouver and Victoria, blessed with a mild oceanic climate, contrast with more rural areas like the Okanagan Valley, known for its vineyards and orchards.



ECONOMY






